





Permits:

Gas or propane recreational fires may be enjoyed only if a permit has been obtained. To receive a permit, contact the South Lake Tahoe Fire Rescue at (530) 542-6160 or visit Fire Station #3, 2101 Lake Tahoe Blvd, between the hours of 8am and 5 pm, Monday through Friday. Original permits will be issued to property owners or agents only after an inspection of the site of the proposed fires. Permits are valid for one year.

BURN BAN INFORMATION:

Fire restrictions will go into effect on July 1, 2016, within the Tahoe National Forest (public land). While May and June rain events slowed the drying out of fuels, hot and dry weather is now upon us, making fire restrictions necessary to provide a safe forest experience.

**OPEN FIRE BAN BEGINS  
JULY 1, 2016 UNTIL THE  
OFFICIAL END OF FIRE  
SEASON.**

No open fires, campfires or charcoal fires are allowed on Tahoe National Forest lands outside of designated areas, even with a valid California Campfire Permit. Lanterns and portable stoves using gas, jellied petroleum or pressurized liquid fuel are allowed. BBQ with charcoal is allowed.

Portable Fire Pits:

All gas or propane recreational fires must be in an approved portable fire pit:

Fire pits must be at least 15 feet from all structures and should be 15 feet from property lines, if possible.

Fire pits must have a diameter no greater than three feet.

The fire pit must be placed on non-combustible material, such as brick or rock, have a metal screen with 1/2" or smaller mesh spacing.

Fire pits cannot be placed under low-hanging branches or other combustible materials.

**This propane fire pit should be on a non-flammable surface and have a screened lid.**
